Thanksgiving For Connecting and Serving Together With a Prayer for Growing 2014 Senior Pastor's Report

It is with joy and thanksgiving that I praise God for the warm, genuine, and generous welcome that I have received in coming to First United Methodist Church of Commerce, Texas. The congregation has been wonderful, bending over backwards to help me feel appreciated and accepted during these months of transition into my pastorate among them. I am especially grateful for their openness and acceptance, and I look forward to my future ministry here with great anticipation.

Commerce's First United Methodist Church is an amazing congregation with an honorable, God graced past. They have impressive human resources, great faith, open hearts and minds, and an eager willingness to serve God and God's children. Their outreach in the community is impressive, their ministries with children and youth are incredible, their mission among the college students at Texas A&M Commerce is awesome, and their support for the senior citizens of Commerce is touching. As of today I cannot begin to catalog all the wonderful ways that this church is in ministry; I am still only learning about them all, observing their scope, breadth, and depth. Indeed, as we move into 2015 I look forward to continuing to discover all the wonderful ways that God works through these people. Also, I look forward to finding ways of plugging in and providing leadership and participating in their many ministries.

It is no secret that First UMC Commerce has recently come through a period of financial crisis. The prior few years have been difficult, with the general economic down-turn playing a huge role in the financial troubles that beset the church. The twin challenges of paying down their debt while trying to meet increasing operational expenses with declining income led the church's leadership to the point of having to face some tragic choices between several unpalatable alternatives during the prior several charge conferences. Thanks to their willingness to make those hard choices, and the faithful dedication, giving, and presence of the church's leadership and the congregation in general, the church has weathered the financial storm, paid off its lingering debt, and now finds itself in a significantly improved economic situation. Income through tithes and offerings is up, attendance in its worship services is improving, its missions and ministries are flourishing, and there is a general attitude of hopeful optimism in the church. The positive outlook among many in the church is playing a large role in the rising tide of the spirit, and lays an impressive foundation for what God is calling the church to do in 2015 and beyond.

The Church's mission and ministries teams – known as **Connect, Grow, and Serve** – are a brilliant way to organize and coordinate the church's activities. **Connect** keeps us hooked together by advancing our outreach to visitors, constituents, active and absent members. **Grow** focuses upon the spiritual health of the congregation by promoting opportunities for worship, study, and faith formation. **Serve** takes the spiritual growth factor and puts it into action through opportunities to reach out to others with the active-Gospel of Jesus Christ. All three areas must work in tandem for all to benefit.

One of the things the congregation has asked for in their pastor is someone who can lead them in their spiritual growth as the people of God. They are looking for guidance and leadership in the spiritual, Biblical, theological, and practical growth of the church, all while maintaining a faithful witness to the calling of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This is an area where I have a particular interest, experience, and success in my ministry. Beginning in 2015 the following Growinitiatives will given specific, principle emphasis.

o **Bible and Theological Study.** In my ministry I have long conducted various kinds of Bible Studies, from leading or supporting Disciple Bible Study, "The Christian Believer" and the Alpha Course, to leading my own "Pastor's Bible Study". These studies have always been well-received and the fruit of their experience has been a blessing to me and to the congregations which I have served. Since FUMCC has a history of lay-lead Disciple Bible Study, I will encourage its continuation. And, in 2015 I intend to launch my "The Pastor's Bible Study" at FUMCC; depending upon the level of interest, I anticipate holding both a day-time session for those who can come only during the day, and a night-time session for those who can only make it at night.

- Targeted Studies: I enjoy leading short-term, targeted studies related to the seasons of the Church year (i.e., Advent, Lent, Easter, Pentecost), as well as on specific topics. For example, I am a facilitators for the UMC's *This Holy Mystery* Communion Study, and have lead it over 50 times across the denomination, as well as in several Churches in the North Texas Conference, the Conference UMW, the Lay Speaker's program, and the Course of Study; I look forward to leading it at FUMCC, along with other subject and seasonal-specific studies.
- The Walk to Emmaus. This incredible "Short Course in Christianity," offered by the United Methodist Church's Upper Room, has long been a critical part of my own spiritual growth and continuing formation as a Christian and as a minister of the Gospel. I have enjoyed serving on Emmaus Walks, and as the Dallas Community Assistant and Senior Spiritual Director, for more than 17 years. I have seen the lives of hundreds of men and women totally changed through their involvement in Emmaus, both as pilgrims and as members of the community, making Walk-retreats possible for others. FUMCC has a small number of Emmaus "Graduates" people who have taken a pilgrim walk in the past and I praise God for this. It is my intention to offer the Emmaus experience to any and all in the Church who would like to go. Commerce is situated in the East Texas Emmaus Community, but is also on the edge of the Dallas Community, with half of Dallas's walks taking place just outside of Royce City at Sabine Creek Ranch (a non-denomination retreat center). My continued involvement on the Board of the Dallas Emmaus Community provides us an opportunity for the Church to plug into what that huge community has to offer and experience walks not too far from home.
- Continued Worship Experiences. FUMCC currently has three weekly worship services: on Sunday morning an 8:45 am informal service in the Chapel and an 11 am Traditional service in the Sanctuary; on Wednesday evening at 5:30 pm we also have a Eucharist Service which is conducted in the Anglican Tradition and Style. All of this will continue, with particular emphasis on providing both new and different experiences within these services. I am especially interested in the Wednesday evening Anglican service; relative to it, it was truly a "God thing" that I was appointed to FUMCC: of all the clergy of the North Texas Conference, it is probably not an exaggeration to say that I am among those best suited by background, training, and temperament to preside at such a service. While those who have joined from the closed Episcopal Church of the Epiphany frequent this service, I am somewhat dismayed that more people from within the congregation at-large don't take advantage of this incredible opportunity to experience the spiritual depth of such a service and receive the Lord's Supper on a weekly basis. I hope, over time, to advance the appreciation and experience of this service both within the congregation and in the Commerce community at-large.

These are just a few areas relative to **Grow** where I will be leading the congregation in 2015. In all of these, and beyond them, it is my prayer that the congregation will be able to benefit from what I have to offer for spiritual formation.

Finally, I want to lift up a general ministry emphasis for the Church. It's in-part relative to the presence of the University across the street, but it would also be true for any United Methodist Church in our society, today. A few of weeks ago in a sermon I asked a pointed question: do the people of Commerce, and its surrounding areas, know that FUMCC is a welcoming place for all? Is the church known as a safe place, a welcoming place, a place of grace and peace, for everyone, without regard for racial, ethnic, economic, social, marital, educational, or any other kind of status-distinction? Are all people welcome to come and be a part of our family of faith as we share the Good News of God's love for all? If we are not known for this – if the church is not looked upon by those across Commerce and the surrounding areas as a place were God's grace abounds – then why is that? And, more importantly, what can we do, as a congregation, to make it known that the call of the Gospel compels us to welcome all? Commerce's First United Methodist Church has a marvelous message to offer and a glorious God to proclaim; we have amazing grace to share. But, if those outside our church don't know that they will be as warmly received, as I was when I arrived, is it any wonder that they don't come?

My prayer for us in 2015 is that we will be about making it clear, through word and deed, that we are open, that we welcome all to come, hear the gospel, partake of God's grace, receive God's incredible love, and become a part of God's wonderful family. Let's make 2015 a Year of God's Welcoming Grace.


