


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Styles of Worship

In last month's newsletter article we took a look at the history of the different forms of worship, about what they all contain, and about the practice of what is usually called "traditional" as outlined in the United Methodist Church's *Hymnal* and *Book of Worship*. As was stated, our 10:50am Sunday morning service follows this Basic Pattern for Worship rather closely, with only occasional variations. Indeed, even within the Basic Pattern there is plenty of room for multiple



structural and stylistic variations, and we have a few of them in our liturgical service. In this article we will consider vestments and certain liturgical gestures that can be seen in traditional worship.

The use of robes and other kinds of worship vestments is nothing new to Methodists in general, or FUMCC in particular: photographs of the consecration service for the 1968 Sanctuary show the participating clergy vested in black robes. Indeed, the wearing of robes by pastors while conducting worship has been common within American Methodism for the better part of a century, and in the South it has been fairly common since the 1950s.

A more recent innovation in liturgical worship attire amongst Protestants has been the adoption of the alb. The alb is a white or flax-colored, lightweight garment worn in Christian worship by participating ministers dating all the way back to the first century AD. It fell out of use by Protestants during the Reformation and only began to be recovered in the middle of the 20th Century. In the 1980s and 1990s United Methodist clergy began wearing the alb, particularly for communion services and during the hot summer months because it is so much lighter and cooler than the black robe. Indeed, the *Book of Worship* recommends the white alb as the principle worship attire for clergy in traditional, liturgical services. Personally, I like the alb because it is much lighter and cooler than the black robe.

In addition to the black robe and the alb, most United Methodist clergy will wear several symbols of the ministerial offices they hold: crosses, stoles, and chasubles are most commonly seen. The stole is the symbol of the order of Elders, of which both Brian and I are members. The colors of the stoles coordinate to the season of the church year as well as to the theme or character of the service (i.e., white is worn for weddings and funerals). Also sometimes seen is the chasuble, which is a "poncho-like" garment that may be worn over the alb and stole by Elders in worship services where they are presiding at Holy Communion. It is usually made of elegant materials and color-coordinated to the liturgical season of the year. Roman Catholics, many Lutherans and Episcopalians, and a small but growing number of United Methodist clergy wear it for services where Communion is to be celebrated.

In addition to various kinds of worship-wear, occasional questions have been asked regarding certain body postures and gestures that I, and others, sometimes make in worship. For instance, when I approach the altar I usually pause and either nod my head or make a short bow: this is a sign of respect for the sacred space, and for God, that the altar and the cross in our sanctuary represent. Similarly, at certain points in the service I will occasionally make the sign of the cross; for instance, while consecrating the elements during Holy Communion and anytime I say the Trinitarian formula ("in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit"), it is fairly common for me to make the sign of the cross. These practices are appropriate and the *Book of Worship* suggests several of them at various points in the service. Not all UM clergy are comfortable with such gestures, and so they are not always seen, but they are nevertheless not unknown among Methodists.

The wearing of robes, albs, stoles, and various postures and gestures can all be part of building an atmosphere or "style" that is conducive to the traditional, liturgical form of worship. Bowing the head for prayer and closing one's eyes to pray are probably among the most commonly known and experienced posture-practices that invoke reverence for God, but they are not the only ones.

- Every 66 seconds, someone in the US develops Alzheimer's
- 1 in 3 seniors dies with Alzheimer's or another dementia

These numbers, of course, don't tell the whole story. They don't include the financial cost of caring for an Alzheimer's victim or the toll it takes on the health of spouses/caregivers. The emotional trauma on friends or family members as they witness the slow descent into oblivion of a once vibrant, intelligent, active, funny, talented loved one is beyond calculation.


