Hummingbird Come Home

Hummingbirds migrate to Mexico or even South America and follow the same paths. Though they may travel together, each individual knows where he has come from and where he is going. And they come back to the same place. A few years ago in Cedar Hill, TX, before I put the feeders out, the hummingbirds came looking for them! I was out doing yardwork and saw the whole scene. One bird came to the exact spot where a feeder had been the previous summer. He halted there and flitted around, examined the empty spot from several angles. Then he flew in an instant to the post where our other feeder had been and hovered there, examining that empty spot as well.



I went to get the feeders from the garage and began to stir up some sugar water. As I thought about what I had just witnessed, my interest and amazement increased. To imagine that tiny fragile creature migrating hundreds, if not a thousand or more miles safely was hard to believe. And then his little navigation system led him back to North America, North Texas, Dallas County, Cedar Hill, High Point, Chapman Street, to my back yard, and to the two exact posts on my patio where our feeders had hung half a year before.

We too are vulnerable creatures in a big world. Our life paths and our spiritual journeys take us far along paths toward God. Sometimes our distractions and even our searchings take us the opposite direction. Perhaps we can learn a lesson from the hummingbirds in finding our way back home to God, the Source of Life.

The part of this story that does not suit me is that hummers are very territorial and defensive of their bounty. I want all of us, God's creatures, to share in what we have found. The worship and fellowship of the church has sometimes been described as "one beggar telling another beggar where to find food". I like that because I am one of the beggars. Whose GPS do you follow when you are needing to find some grace? Or share some grace?



Our Wesleyan Campus Ministry was celebrated at the East District Conference, Sunday 5/19 at FUMC Sulphur Springs. District Superintendent Rev. Vic Casad shared the good news during his report on new growth developments in the District; "this appointment has always been combined with being Associate at FUMC Commerce. That is changing. It is a historic change for our Annual Conference that the Wesleyan is becoming an autonomous church with a full-time pastor and that will be Rev. Brian Dierolf." This announcement was warmly received with applause and big smiles from the clergy and lay delegates of

the District. Rev. Casad encouraged churches to provide a Wednesday free lunch and all were asked to invite me to guest preach over the summer.

Support of our ministry continues to grow in the East District. We recently were given a generous donation from the UMW of McKenzie UMC, (as of 5/20) I already have three Sundays in July that I will be guest preaching, and both Mikey Elwell and David Kemp will also be guest preaching!

In this time of transition and growth, everyone's support is more important than ever! Together we are not only providing an inclusive and welcoming "home away from home," we are not only attracting young adults who have been hurt by the church, we are not only deepening discipleship, and feeding hungry bellies, we are raising up the next generation of gifted United Methodist leaders/pastors!!!

S.C.R.P.T. by Judy Rudoff



S.C.R.P.T—Senior Center Resources and Public Transportation—is a county agency that provides important services to Hunt County citizens.

Many of you have seen the big white buses with blue puzzle pieces, with the telephone number 903-454-1444 known as the Connection. However, you may not be aware of the services it can provide or how to avail yourself of them.

The Connection is a bus service that travels throughout Hunt County and even provides a Park and Ride option. To ride the Connection one needs to make a reservation 24 hours in advance at 903-454-1444 and follow the prompts (although reservations must be made before 3pm; confirmation might be as late as 7pm.) People of all ages may use the Connection; however, for those over 60 years old, rides to the grocery store, pharmacy, hospital, or doctor's office are free. For other destinations like the post office, library,



bank, or beauty shop, the charge is \$2 each way in town and \$3 each way in the county. For those under 60, the \$2 and \$3 fees apply for every trip. Same day reservations—if there is space available—can be made at a cost of \$4 each way. To take advantage of the Park and Ride option, reservations must also be made 24 hours in advance by calling Logistics Care at 855-687-3255. The Connection will pick you up and take you to Rowlett where DART buses will take you to Dallas destinations. For those who qualify for Medicare or Medicaid, there is no charge. For those without those insurances, the fee is \$5 each way. All Connection buses have mechanisms so that people using walkers or wheelchairs can easily and safely board.

Another S.C.R.P.T. program less well-known where unencumbered funds can really make a difference is the nutrition program. Each day approximately 350 meals are cooked to be delivered between 11:30am and 12:30pm. That's over 60,000 meals a month! Deliveries are made five days a week, including two frozen meals for the weekend. Deliveries are also made to two community sites: Hunt Regional Emergency Medical Center at Commerce and S.C.R.P.T. headquarters in Greenville, so people can enjoy company, play Bingo, and other games and have health screenings. Because most of the funding comes from the Texas Department of Agriculture, strict guidelines for calories and portion size must be followed. A S.C.R.P.T. dietician designs the menu and assures the requirements are met. Unencumbered funds allow the agency to add extras:

a quart of real milk each week instead of powdered milk or providing five meals a week to someone who may only qualify for three.

Funding for S.C.R.P.T. comes from several major sources: Hunt County grants, T-DOT, and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

What can I do to help?

- 1. Spread the word about what S.C.R.P.T. has to offer.
- 2. Put a dollar or designated gift in the offering plate in June, since S.C.R.P.T. is the June Mission of the Month.
