The Serve team is seeking volunteers who want to show and deepen their faith by serving others when requests for help are received. In order to respond timely to requests for help, the Serve team would like to form a bank of Helping Hands volunteers who will essentially be on-call.

How Helping Hands Formed

From a violent storm that hit Commerce and the surrounding area a little more than two years ago came the realization of definite needs in our own

community and a desire to meet those needs. Thus formed Helping Hands as one of several focus areas of the Serve team.

What Helping Hands Does

From trimming bushes and tree limbs to painting fences and washing windows, Helping Hands has answered requests from those who can't help themselves. Church members have joined with Wesleyan students and, at times members of other local churches, to "fix what needed fixing". Helping Hands performs odd jobs, home repairs, and maintenance for low-income, elderly and disabled homeowners who are physically or financially unable to do the work themselves.

How Helping Hands Works

When a project request is communicated to the church office or to the Helping Hands coordinator, it will be assessed and then volunteers from the Helping Hands crew will be put into action.

A Word From Our Stewardship Team:

At its last meeting, FUMC's Stewardship Team adopted the following action plan to revitalize the health of our church:

- Look for a letter from the Leadership Team outlining strategies to eliminate the current deficit in the general op-1 erating fund of approximately \$23,000 as of March 31.
- 2. Reflect and communicate 2011 budget saving and reductions. To date, we have identified at least \$19,000 in savings and reductions to the budget.
- 3. Investigate the possibility of repairing the WCM roof with remaining unspent insurance settlement funds from the sanctuary and chapel roofs.
- 4. Request that the Foundation reimburse the organ fund and parsonage fund in the amount of \$17,000. These deficits occurred in 2009 and could not be reimbursed due to the downturn in the economy. These funds are not part of the general operating budget and this amount in not reflected in the \$23,000 mentioned in number 1.
- Encourage the members through education, sermons, informal gatherings and prayer to consider increasing giving 5. instead of focusing entirely on cutting programs.
- Consider expanding the ministry, rather than maintaining the status-quo, by fulfilling the concepts of Connect-6. Grow-Serve.
- 7. Strive to continue to communicate to the members the status of the ministries, missions, and finances of the church.
