





#### Why We Prepare in Lent?

It is always a good idea to take a momentary step back from one's Lenten journey of self-examination to reflect upon where we are. And, it's also a good idea to begin this reflection by examining a fundamental Christian truth which we often forget amidst the chores of preparation: the reality of God's Grace.



"For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing, it is the gift of God-not the result of works, lest any one should boast. For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life." (Ephesians 2:8-10)

No amount of preparation, no amount of self-examination, no amount of self-denial will save you. Our Lenten journey must always be balanced with the continual realization that nothing we do will ever save us. It is only by the grace of God, received through faith, that we are saved. We cannot merit, or earn, salvation. As Paul said, "it is a gift of God."

So why do we spend so much time in Lent engaging in self-examination and preparation? I can come up with two good reasons: firstly, we must be made ready to see our culpability in Christ's crucifixion and death; and, secondly, we must be willing to join him in his sacrifice and death so that we will be able to also join him in his resurrection from the dead.

You see, we are the reason Jesus hangs on the cross. We are the reason Jesus came into this world, lived with us, taught and loved us, and then died on the cross. We, just as surely as the Roman soldiers, drove the nails into his feet and wrists. We are the reason for this season. Our exercises in self-examination help us to come face-to-face with this truth. We often want to deny our culpability in Christ's death – Lord knows, I would like to – but if we try to deny it, we will also deny the gift of grace itself. It is a gift we can turn down: we don't have to accept it. But, if we open ourselves through careful preparation, we will discover that it is simply impossible for us to deny our guilt. We are the reason Jesus went to the cross. And, with this realization, it becomes possible for us to actually accept the gift of forgiveness.

When we have confronted our sins and have truly come to grips with our culpability for his death, we will finally be able to see Jesus on the cross as he really is: our savior. And, when this happens we will also be able to join Jesus there as he defeats our sin through death, and our death through his resurrection.

Yes, the gift is free. Grace actually means "unmerited favor." But, we must not be tempted to turn down the gift by refusing to truly see Christ crucified and our role in his suffering and death. We prepare during Lent so that we won't miss him when he is crucified. We prepare during Lent so that our eyes will be opened and our hearts made ready to receive the gift of God's saving grace. It really is too precious a gift to turn down.

#### **UM ARMY: The Hands and Feet of Jesus**

Most of us are familiar with the story in Matthew 25:35-40 which begins, "for I was hungry and you gave me to eat" and ends "...'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." U. M. ARMY puts these words into action by literally being the hands and feet of Jesus during their annual mission trip. For those not "in the know," U. M. ARMY stands for United Methodist Action Reach-Out Mission by Youth.



This summer, our Youth, under Youth Director John Pollock, will venture to Vernon, TX, the week of June 20-25<sup>th</sup>. There, they will actively participate in the community of Vernon to work at pre-selected homes owned by the residents. Their work will involve jobs such as sanding, painting, trimming trees and bushes, mowing, cleaning up yard debris, constructing wheel chair ramps, repairing windows, doors, stairs, and porches, and the like.

While the campers are working at the houses, they are also actively engaging with the homeowners. "The teams bring a lunch to share with their client each day and are encouraged to interact as much as possible," states the North by Northwest (NXNW) Chapter of UM ARMY's website. It's a mutually beneficial program. The homeowners benefit from the repairs to their homes which they are unable to do themselves due to physical health, age, or financial need, and the students benefit from the work they do and the relationships they build with the owners. It's a win-win situation! According to Jim Patton, "developing a relationship [with the owners] is as important as doing a repair." Jim and Susan Patton have participated the last several years in order to help with the on-site work efforts and to prepare the meals for the campers. Jim is also a member of the NXNW Chapter Board.

On Thursday evening of the designated work week, the homeowners are invited to come to the host church to celebrate in a meal and worship service with the campers who have been working on their homes all week. It has been described as an unparalleled spiritual experience for both the residents and campers to have the families involved come and worship with and are served by the campers. The residents are given an opportunity to tell what the week's worth of work means to them. Both Pastor Brian and Jim Patton describe this worship service, as well as the whole experience, to be "life-changing." Campers go home with a new attitude and a new sense of value for others, i.e., spiritual growth through selfless service.

This year the Lenten Offering and the Drop-a-Dollar funds for the entire forty-day period of Lent will go toward building scholarship funds for our Youth to participate in this summer's UM ARMY program. The cost for each student to participate is \$250.



Last year, ten campers participated in UM ARMY from our church and community. All ten campers and four adult chaperones attended the week-long event on scholarships provided by our church.

The \$250 participation fee is used to "buy building materials for our projects, pay for food costs, program materials for camps, and general administrative overhead for the NXNW Chapter, plus a small portion to the national organization for administrative costs and program development," states Jim. "The kids need a little bit of discretionary funding for snacks and one meal out during the week. All other meals are provided by the camps," he adds. Besides the Lenten Offering and the

Drop-a-Dollar campaign, the Youth host an annual rummage sale later in the spring in order to fully fund their trip. David and Luann Huffman of Huffman's Farm Supply are always very gracious in lending their parking lot to the Youth for this purpose. The money raised from all three sources goes directly to pay for the fees for the participants of the program, youth and adult volunteers alike. Travel expenses are often absorbed by the adult volunteers; however, the church will pay for gasoline if needed.

The program is open to both junior high and high school students. The mixed groups, consisting of both junior high and high school age students, spend a five-day period at the host church, while exclusively high school age campers spend a full week from Sunday to Saturday. This year, our U. M. ARMY campers will consist of a mixed group.

The Youth are not the only ones who reap the benefits of this life-changing experience. Adult chaperones are needed. If you think you can make a difference the summer by being a part of the U. M. There will also be many opportunities to serve the U. M. ARMY when FUMC-Commerce hosts another church's team the week of June 26<sup>th</sup> following the return of our campers.

So, what do the Youth actually get out of this experience? Jim Patton answers, "UM Army builds character and instills in our youth the value of selfless service to others." John Pollock adds that they gain "spiritual growth as well as leadership skills." And who doesn't want those attributes for our Youth? Please give generously during this Lenten season so that our Youth can be the hands and feet of Jesus in this unique mission and service opportunity.




