

# Your Church at Work: Drop-a-Dollar October Offering

Drop-a-Dollar brought in \$382 during October to help support local food assistance programs. This amount plus the \$925 raised by the FUMC's Usher Stew on October 24 resulted in \$1,307 given to the Commerce Alliance of Ministry to help feed hungry people today.

Your financial support is critical now more than ever to the Alliance and the people it serves in our community for two reasons. First, North Texas Food Bank (NTFB) agencies such as Word of Life Family Church in Commerce are faced with a price increase on many items it buys from 18 cents a pound to 28 cents a pound. Quite simply, demand is up and donations are down at the NTFB, which is why it has had to share that cost with its agencies.

Secondly, Alliance-member Healing Waters Assembly God Church is in the process of becoming the second NTFB agency in Commerce. This church plans to distribute food to families twice a month beginning in 2011, which means there soon be a food distribution weekly in Commerce.

Going forward, \$100 per month from the Drop-a-Dollar will go to the Alliance of Ministry. Thank you for your compassion to help support growing food assistance programs in Commerce.

#### Dear FUMC Friends:

I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you. . . Philippians 1.3-4

Last week, as we were preparing for the Open House here at the parsonage, Rick remarked, "Hmmm. . .smells like Thanks-

giving!" So it did, as the aromas of roasting pecans and pumpkin bread spread throughout the house.

And here we are, in the season of Thanksgiving. Many of us are making preparations for the holiday: where and with whom we'll be; what the menu will contain (anything new? or the tried-and-trues?); who will cook what. Some intrepid souls will be waist-deep in planning for our annual Community Thanksgiving meal, ensuring that everyone will have a place at the table on Thanksgiving Day.

But I think Thanksgiving is more than just one day – I like to think of it as a season. The attitude and act of thankfulness deserves much more of our attention than one day! Our culture doesn't help with this very much. In late October, Halloween and Christmas decorations often occupy different sides of the same aisle. Thanksgiving is often lumped in with Christmas and New Year's – a span of time labeled "the Holidays."

For people of faith, giving thanks goes beyond a day, or a season for that matter. Giving thanks is a stance toward life itself, and toward the Creator who gave us life. The act of giving thanks requires memory, too. The apostle Paul couples the words "thanks" and "remember." It is often in the recalling of what has happened in the past that gives us the opportunity to pause and give thanks for what exists now.

Our memory can call up the simple: the way afternoon sunlight falls across the land in autumn, or the wonderful smells of cinnamon and nutmeg wafting through a warm kitchen. Often, the simple is connected to the more profound: the company and laughter of loved ones on a sunny autumn afternoon; the presence of longpassed family who taught us to cook with spices, passing on wisdom and stories at the same time. Just the act of remembering can cause thanks to bubble up from within: how wondrous to be given the gifts of beauty, the company of those we love, and of being called into familial relationship in the divine household.

I do indeed give thanks for each and every one of you, and for the witness of faith lived out by this congregation in the past, and being lived in the present. Let us remember together, and be thankful.
