#### Dear FUMC Friends:

Living in the early part of a new century gives rise to some pretty remarkable calendar events. Last October we experienced 10-10-10, and this coming Friday will be 11-11-11. The date represents an interesting bit of trivia to some, and is, no doubt, of magnificent import to those who traffic in 'grand meaning' behind numbers and dates. For many of us though, the special date draws attention to Veterans' Day.



Veteran's Day this year is especially poignant, as the reports of military fatalities and injuries continue to reach us through news stories. For some of us, such reports fall on our doorstep unexpectedly. We received word in the church office last week that the son of one of our East District clergy stepped on a land mine in Afghanistan, and is recovering from his very serious wounds at a military hospital in Germany. The only proper response we can have as a people of faith is to envelop this soldier with our prayers, praying for his healing and eventual recovery.

My dad, who passed away eleven years ago in October, served in World War II in the Pacific Theater. He was a SeaBee on Guam and Okinawa. He would answer my endless questions about what his days were like, was he afraid, what did a SeaBee do, and on and on my questions went. It doesn't require much imagination to suppose that my dad's indulgence of my questioning helped shape my love of history, and the stories of that war in particular.

My dad's brother wasn't so ready to share stories about his experiences in that same war. My Uncle James was rail thin (whereas my dad tended toward the portly), smoked cigarette after cigarette (my dad had quit years before), and deflected my questions about what WWII was like in a gentle – though definite – way. My dad told me that Uncle James had been taken prisoner during the Battle of the Bulge, and had spent the rest of the war in a German POW camp. Cigarettes were used as barter for food in the camp, and my uncle had traded away a nice pen my grandfather had given him for additional food.

The sacrifices our young men and women make on behalf of our country is inspiring and sobering. Whatever opinions one may hold on the current wartime situation have little bearing on the difficulties – mental and physical – that our military face if they make it out alive and whole. What will have bearing on those who have served is our response to them: support, engagement, accommodation, inclusion. These are the behaviors that will speak louder than words as our military adjust to life after the conflict.

There is a little-known story in I Chronicles 11 about David before he was crowned king of Israel. He was battling against the Philistines and holed up in a cave near Hebron in the South. He voiced out loud his longing for a sip of water from the well near the gate of Bethlehem, the town of his birth. Three of his commanders – the text calls them "The Three" – broke through enemy lines and went to that well. They drew water and brought it back to David. His response is one of the most beautiful in scripture. As David poured the water out as an offering to the Lord, he said: "My God forbid that I should do this. Can I drink the blood of these men? For at the risk of their lives they brought it." (I Chronicles 11.19)

Our cup is emptied in honor and recognition of those who serve, and our prayers surround them. May the day of peace come soon.
