diced, measured, poured, and stirred and the soup turned out PERFECT! It smelled wonderful while it was cooking and I'm sure it was thoroughly enjoyed by all of those who ate it this past Thursday! :)

Dear FUMC Friends:

Let me begin with a confession: I hate to pray in public. But as the only clergy person present in many meetings, it often falls to me to begin or end a meeting in prayer, so I offer some prayerful words, hoping I'm not repeating myself ad nauseum, droning on like so many preachers and deacons I heard in my childhood. My hunch is that I'm not alone in this.

Praying in public ranks right up there with speaking in public for many – a fear that ranks somewhere in the top five fears the American public share.

Entering the ministry, however, brought me face to face with my hesitance about praying in public – and I had to get over it fast! I found great help – and an authentic prayer voice – in a little book my mom suggested to me. It's titled *Singer of Seasons*, authored by Beverly Sawyer, a pastor who served in Arkansas. I flipped open her book the other day, and found myself moved once again by her ability to gather together the heart-voices of those in her congregation into one beautiful prayer. I'd like to share one of her autumn prayers with you (written around 1980). May you find your heart-voice in it as well.

It's finally autumn. God, the heat is finally over. and all that remains of summer afternoons are the closing games between the Phillies and the Royals.

We breathe a sigh of relief each time we open the door upon the chilly air, for of all the hot Augusts and dry Julys, these were the worst that many can remember.

We breathe a sigh of relief as we switch the hall thermostat from "A.C." to "Heat" and hope that the coming winter is mild and the bills moderate.

We breathe a sigh of relief, for the change in the weather is welcomed, the thunder and the rains, the winds that carry the brown leaves across the yard and tease the green leaves still on the trees, are all welcomed signs of change vet to come.

We usually don't welcome change God, we usually argue and hesitate and balk.

We sigh – but not with relief when we look in the mirror to find that passing years have left their marks in the gray of the hair and the lines [around] the eyes.

We usually don't welcome change – for the cutting down of the tree that held our childhood playhouse, or a construction detour on our customary route to work, or a different order in the Sunday worship, or a different hair style becoming vogue, reminding us that things seldom remain the same way long, reminding us that life is changeful, and that our youth, our health, our security, our happiness, our relationships are not static and never stand still.

Help us, O God, as we listen for the distant honk of autumn geese to turn our faces toward the unknown days of winter, to release the joys and griefs of the past so that our hands and hearts will be free to embrace our coming lives.

It's autumn, God. Amen.

Make plans <u>now</u> to help bring hope to our neighbors in need this Thanksgiving season through two community events happening at FUMC-C in November.

Thanksgiving Food Basket Distribution on November 19

We will again serve as a distribution site for the Thanksgiving food baskets provided by the Hunt County Coalition of Pantries. In 2010, 190 Commerce-area families received all the foodstuffs, including a frozen turkey, to prepare a large holiday meal. Many recipients also returned to join us for dinner Thanksgiving Day!

Ways to Get Involved:

- Thanksgiving basket packing From 5:30 to 7:00 pm on November 15, 16, and 17, help sack non-perishables at Hunt County Shared Ministries (FISH) in Greenville.
- *Non-perishable food unloading* On the evening of Thursday, November 17, help unload basket provisions at the church.
- *Distribution* On the morning of Saturday, November 19, perform final assembly of baskets and distribute to families at the church.
- *Monetary Gifts* Give a monetary donation to help cover the cost of the food, which is either donated or purchased from the North Texas Food Bank. FISH estimates the cost per food basket at \$7.31.



Community Thanksgiving Dinner and Meal Delivery on November 24




Last year more than 200 people came through our doors to find a place at the table and more than 100 meals were delivered to homebound Commerce residents. This year, we are planning in excess of 300 meals.

Ways to Get Involved:

• Soup for the Soul – Make a pot of your family's favorite soup, stew or chili to provide additional home-cooked meal for Meals-on-Wheels clients during the holiday weekend.

- Pie Baking
- *Hosting* Assist with meal preparation, serving, and clean-up Thanksgiving Day.
- *Home Deliveries* Deliver a Thanksgiving meal and a blessing to those who are homebound.
- *Monetary Gifts* Give a monetary donation to help cover the cost of the dinner. Expenses for the 2010 dinner totaled \$973.82.





Rev. Jose Luis Visits FUMC-Commerce

Rev. Jose Luis Portillo and head maestro Martin Lechuga of Proyecto Abrigo in Juarez, Mexico visited FUMC-Commerce during the 10:50 worship service on October 23. In his message, Jose Luis updated the congregation about his work to build cinder block homes for the people of Loma Blanca, a poverty-stricken area just outside Juarez. Before the 12' X 24' concrete cinder block home is built, the recipient family quite often is living in a cardboard and trash bag "house" fortified by any other scraps such as tire remants or wooden pal-



lets that can be found in the Chihuahuan desert. In the 15 years that the mission project has been operating, Jose Luis and teams from the US have built homes for over 5,000 families.

Because the violence in Mexico is so rampant, teams no longer travel to Juarez to build homes. In spite of the incredible odds, Jose Luis is still serving the people of Juarez by trying to sustain the medical clinic that sees as many as 40 patients daily and by trying to provide food staples and supplies for the many families in need. In addition, supplies are always needed for the mission's school, its community training center, and for future home building projects that might be accomplished with enough monetary contributions. Two homes have been built this year with funds from two other churches.

Items the congregation has collected thus far for the mission will accompany Jose Luis on his return trip; however, we have temporarily suspended further collections (with the exception of prescription bottles) due to the extreme difficulty and expense in shipping them to Mexico. At this time, the best way to impact the work of Jose Luis and that of Proyecto Abrigo is to make a designated monetary contribution. You can make a regular contribution by adding the designation in the memo line of your usual offering checks, or you can make a special offering designated for Proyecto Abrigo.



Rev. Valarie Englert presented a monetary gift in the amount of \$300 to Rev. Jose Luis for Proyecto Abrigo. The funding came from the proceeds from your aluminum can recycling (keep those cans coming in!), some of the drop-adollar giving, and from some funds budgeted from the Serve Team.

Ricky Dobbs offered a blessing upon Jose Luis and Martin and their work at Proyecto Abrigo during the prayer time. Members of the Serve Team and others were invited to stand with Jose Luis and Martin who knelt at the Communion rail for this special benediction.

Following the service, a small group of congregants treated Jose Luis and Martin to lunch at a local restaurant.

Usher Stew Brought in \$900 to Feed the Hungry

For a second year in a row, the stew luncheon raised \$900 to support food assistance programs. The proceeds were shared amongst the Emergency Food Pantry at the First Presbyterian Church of Commerce, Meals on Wheels of Commerce, the Commerce Food Distribution & Manna Movers at Word of Life Family Church, and FISH – Hunt County Shared Ministries of Greenville.



Members from other local churches, including Church of the Nazarene, First

Presbyterian, Griffith Chapel, Healing Waters, and Word of Life, joined us around the table to support



this common cause. In addition, many members of the University Chorale stayed after their participation in the 10:50 am worship service to enjoy a bowl of stew and fellowship.

Special thanks to Bob Mills and Jim Latham for preparing the hearty chicken and beef stews, to Joe Milligan for cooking Dutch oven cobblers over hot briquettes, to Laura Milligan and Anne Mills for managing the dining area, and to all the volunteers who made cornbread and desserts and helped serve and clean-up.

What Can be Recycled:

Plastic-Please remove all caps

Numbers 1,2,3,4,5 & 7. Milk jugs, liter bottles, shampoo bottles etc. Please rinse.

- **No butter tubs or containers with openings as large as the container.
- **No bottles that have contained oil or petroleum by products.

Glass-All colors of glass bottles. No plate glass, mirrors, or ceramic. Please rinse.

Metal– All metal food and beverage cans, remove lids, discard, and rinse. No aluminum foil.

Newspaper, catalogs, and magazines– Newspapers, catalogs and magazines can be recycled. Do not bundle or place in bags.

Junk Mail, cardboard and mixed household paper-Junk mail, envelopes, cereal boxes, cardboard, chipboard and any other household paper product. No tissues, wet paper or paper contaminated with food products accepted. All cardboard must be broken down to as much as possible. Only flattened boxes accepted.
