

Daily Scriptures & Memorials Prayer List

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Dear FUMC Friends:

A few weeks ago in this space I wrote about my East Texas grandmother and her habit of always having peach preserves on the table with every meal – breakfast, lunch, and dinner. She insisted that having something sweet on the table with the meal (not afterwards as dessert) was necessary to rounding out all the different dishes and flavors on the table.



Many of our Jewish brothers and sisters celebrated Rosh Hashanah this month - the Jewish New Year – and many did so by eating apples and honey together at the celebratory meal in the hope that the upcoming year will be sweet and good.

This custom was introduced to me one summer when I was working in the office at the Dallas Memorial Center for Holocaust Studies. I had been a volunteer tour guide for several years, but this particular summer they were short an office person, and I needed some income between semesters. So the arrangement suited both parties very well.

In the front office, I worked with a woman named Ida, who had been born and raised in South Africa, but whose grandparents and parents hailed from Eastern Europe. I was the only Christian on the small staff, and Ida and I had many wonderful conversations about different holiday customs (we talked about food a lot!), differing ways of viewing scripture, and our beliefs as persons of faith. Neither tried to convert the other - we just talked.

On Fridays, Ida would leave about three or four in the afternoon so she could go home and prepare the Sabbath meal. Before she would leave, I would ask her to describe to me the meal she would be preparing. Her Sabbath meals always included something sweet: Chicken baked with apricots (a dish she made often), or beef braised with raisins and other seasonings. And always challah - that rich, slightly sweet bread. She explained that having something sweet in the meal symbolized the sweetness of the Sabbath, and God's gift in giving a day free from work.

My memories of working with Ida that summer are cherished ones: through our sharing and conversation, I like to think that Ida and I participated in what the rabbis call *Tikkun Olam* – which can roughly be translated as "repairing the world." According to rabbinic understanding, this is no ordinary do-good notion. Tikkun Olam is part of God's intended Shalom - or deep, complete peace and justice – for the whole world, and we are invited to be a part of that great work.

The conversations with Ida have been at the front of my mind in the past week or so, prompted mainly by the anniversary of 9/11 and the threat of one misguided pastor to burn the Ouran. While I do not believe the two events – the tragedy of nine years ago and the possibility of the Quran burning – are directly analogous to each other, I do believe they both are deeply contrary to what God intends for all creation: Tikkun Olam and Shalom. Or in Christian terms, the redemption of the world through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ – a redeemed world marked by the peace of Christ that passes all understanding.

Christ told the crowds – and tells us – "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be children of God." (Matthew 5.9) It is my prayer that we shall indeed be the peacemakers and therefore children of God, one conversation at a time, one shared meal at a time. And don't forget something sweet.

May God's peace that passes all understanding be with you –

M&M is an afterschool program for children in kindergarten through 6th grade. M&M stands for Missions and More.

For the "MISSIONS" aspect, the

children are immersed in service activities all year long. Many are small and can be completed in one or two meetings, others span several months. We will try to choose projects that tap into the gifts that children have in abundance – their energy, their creativity, their love – rather than ones that require monetary gifts. Our hope and our praver is that the children who spend the year with us will take away the notion that EVERYONE has something to share, and EVERYONE – big and small, young and old – can spread the love of God and serve his or her friends and neighbors (here and around the world!) in real and meaningful ways.

And as for the "MORE"... well, that's a pretty big part of the program as well! We pick the kids up from school, feed them a snack, and give them time to do some reading or complete homework – with adult help if needed. We have a lot of fun. too! Lots of games, outside playing and good ol' goofing off happen here too!

By the end of last year we had 52 children who participated in M&M weekly! Although we have certainly had to do some adjusting to accommodate such a big group, we are absolutely committed to keeping our doors WIDE open to all children who would like to participate in this program. There are no enrollment or participation fees for the children who come to M&M. This program, that serves so many (from our church, from other churches, and who have no church home at all) is made possible only because so many of you at FUMC are committed to our children and SO generously support the ministry we do here.
