


GHILDREN'S MINISTRY BICKS OFF A NEW YEAR

Dear FUMC Friends:

My family and I have had a somewhat unsettled summer, and a busy vacation. Our daughter, Eva, graduated from college in May. The afternoon after the ceremonies, we packed her up and moved her from her college apartment to the small town of Morrilton, Arkansas, where she was serving at the First United Methodist Church as a minister to children and families. Two months later, we packed her up again, and moved her home to Commerce. Two weeks later, we put her on a plane



to Boston, where she is serving as a "Micah Fellow" in an intentional Christian community that seeks to act out God's love and justice in the neighborhoods of Boston.

In the midst of all that, we spent our vacation on the Jersey shore, helping my mother-in-law, Linda, pack up and move from the house she has called home since 1959, the house in which she and my father-in-law raised my husband and his sister. The move was of her own initiation, as she was tired of dealing with flights of stairs and maintaining a house that was larger than her needs.

Linda had gathered together several boxes of family mementos and pictures for Rick to go through and claim what he would like to keep. He took the boxes to the screened-in back porch – one of our favorite sitting areas – and I sat next to him as he began sifting through old photos.

My husband pointed out a small box that contained some medals, dog tags and a belt buckle, and a very small box that contained a purple heart. These were the personal effects of his Uncle Stan – sibling of his father – who was killed in action in the battle of Saipan during WWII.

One of the medals caught my eye. The inscription on it read:

The United States of America, 1941 – 1945 Freedom from Fear and Want Freedom of Speech and Religion

I was moved by what I read on that medal, and then felt a pang of sadness. This inscription seems to describe us Americans less and less. The order of the day now seems to be one dominated by rigidity, the politics of fear, free-flowing anger and unchecked speech.

Here's the deal, though. Congregations – be they Christian, Sikh, Muslim, Jewish, Hindu, or Buddhist – don't have to follow the cultural crowd. As Christians, we live under a different rule, a rule that turns abusive power and the politics of fear inside out and upside down. We are called to live the "most excellent way" characterized by hope, faith, and love.

Here in Commerce, we can do that – live the most excellent way of Jesus Christ, one act at a time.

May God's peace be with you – *Valarie*

How to Get Started

Thursday, September 20, at 6:30 pm, in the A.C. Williams Library Bring your driver's license and social security card to expedite the processing of your paperwork. Background checks are run on all volunteer applicants.

Ways to Serve

At the Commerce Boys & Girls Club, an afterschool program held at A.C. Williams Elementary for children in 1st through 5th grades:

- *Homework assistance/tutoring:* Give a child the attention they deserve during Power Hour from 3:30 pm to 4:30 pm. This is a time for kids to refuel with a healthy snack and tackle their homework.
- *Reading:* Read to a child or simply listen and help them with that big word.
- Sharing your passion: Each of us has a special interest or skill. You choose the topic, format and timing – it could be a one-time demonstration or weekly classes. It's called a "club within a club" and is an opportunity for enrichment. For example, last year FUMC-C member Joanna Thrift led an art club. Your hobby might be just

what some child needs to keep them going when the going gets tough.



With Communities In Schools at Commerce High School and A.C. Williams:

- *Mentoring:* Become a caring adult in the life of child by listening, asking questions, and providing consistency.
- *Tutoring:* Work one-on-one with a student to help him/her in a specific subject.
- *Classroom Assistant:* Help a teacher with a specific student or group of students so that the teacher can become more effective at teaching and making sure that everyone understands the concepts that are being taught.

How Does the Commerce Boys & Girls Club Impact CIS Mentoring?

If you mentor a student at A.C. Williams, you will have the option to meet with them during the afterschool program rather than during the school day. Elementary CIS kids are encouraged to join the Commerce Boys & Girls Club, which means more flexibility for you.

Boys & Girls Club Summer Camp: One Volunteer's Perspective

FUMC-C asked Tom Bailey to share his reflections on what it was like to volunteer twice a week during the Boys and Girls Summer Camp held at A.C. Williams Elementary. Tom is a seasoned Communities In Schools mentor and would be happy to further discuss his experience with you or answer your questions. Here's what he had to say:

The Summer Camp was a good thing in all ways for the kids, the sponsors, and the volunteers. I was one of the volunteers. Fellow FUMC-C member Bill

Heitholt was another.

I couldn't help but notice the changes in the kids over the summer. At first, everything was chaos, but the kids seemed to recognize that they got more with a bit of order though they were always exuberant. Better, some of the ones who were remote and disinterested at first discovered that interesting things were going on, and they began to participate. One boy on my last day, when asked what he'd learned, announced that "this is vacation and I'm not learning anything" but still reported about some of the activities that he thought were interesting.

Over the summer, the numbers of kids varied from about 45 to as much as 55 or more, aged 5 to 11. According to one of the Boys and Girls Club staff, about half of the kids live with only one or neither of their parents, and their economic backgrounds matched the demographics of Commerce families: about three-quarters qualify as economically disadvantaged. The campers were of all sizes and shapes and capabilities. Some were clearly faster to learn than others, but most tried hard. I was encouraged.

The Boys and Girls Club staff members were excellent. About two-thirds of them were young men, which sort of surprised me, but they really cared about their young charges, and they kept things mostly orderly. I assume some of the kids have little or no contact with a father figure,

and these lads fulfilled that role admirably. The women were also excellent and could quiet a noisy throng with just a few words.

What did I do? Well, anything that needed doing. My moment of glory was doing a session on aeronautics. I'm sure not a teacher but I do know something about how airplanes fly. I cut out a bunch of little paper gliders that looked like an airplane and gave one to each child. Their task was to fold them and then experiment to see if they could get them to fly. The first boy to finish flew his airplane across the room to the applause of all his classmates. That made it all worthwhile for me.

The summer camp was a joint project by the Boys and Girls Club staff, teacher Linda Grubert and administrators of A.C. Williams, and our own Matt Wolcott of Communities In Schools. All played an important role, and if nothing else, I came away from the experience impressed with everyone. We are indeed blessed with such competent, caring folks in our community.

Was it all perfect? Hardly! Despite the best efforts of the staff, teachers, and volunteers, schedules changed and messages got mislaid, misinterpreted, or forgotten. But none of that diminishes the value or the rewards of the effort. I do hope the kids learned as much from Summer Camp as I did. And if you have some time and think you might like to participate, come on in. The water's fine. You'll be glad you did.

New Monasticism and Missional **Micro-Communities**

What is New Monasticism? New Monasticism is a movement in the modern church to draw upon the wisdom of the monastic communities from the Church's tradition. These 'modern day monks' – many of whom are young adults -- are changing the landscape of what we call church and helping the church as a whole understand that there is more to being a Christian than just attending worship on Sundays. The New Monastics choose to live an intentional life style under a Rule of Life.

What is a Rule of Life, you ask? A Rule of Life is a commitment made by a community of believers who want to be rooted in a life of prayer, hospitality, and justice – what can be called a Missional Micro-Community. Often times this includes meeting together for a weekly gathering to worship, pray, and eat together, or choosing to live on "the bad side of town" to help those in need. Ultimately, they are committed to a missional lifestyle, living among those they seek to serve.

Do the New Monastics live together? Sometimes. They don't usually live in big abbeys like most of us think when we think of monks. Usually, they all live in the same neighborhood though, close together, so that they can meet for prayer or for meals. Still, other times, it is just a group of people from all over a town that sees a need to reach out to others who would usually not be reached, and they decide to come together to help, pray for, and be hospitable to them.

Does this mean a New Monastic has to wear a robe and can't be married? Not at all. The people who participate in these types of communities are normal people like you and I, and wear normal clothes, like flip flops! They just have committed themselves to a more intentional lifestyle beyond their church family. New Monasticism supports both singles and married couples as having important roles in a community.

Are there communities like this near us? Yes! There are five of them located in Dallas and one located in Mabank, Texas. Even better is that they are Methodist. Their ministries are as diverse as helping refugees to having weddings in their back yard to running a children's after school program. All are really involved in finding ways to meet the needs of their community by living amongst and near those in need.
